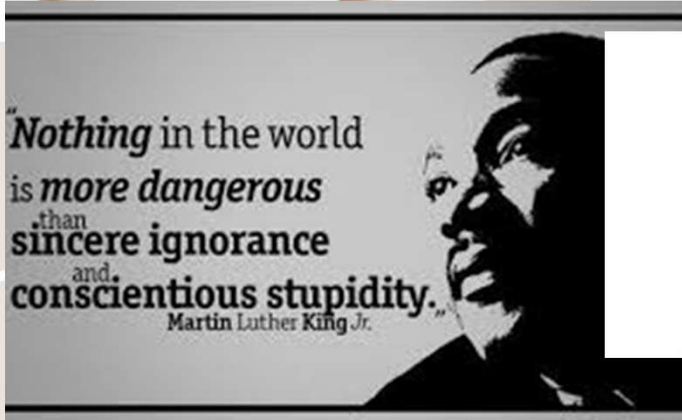

Confirmation Bias & Critical Thinking

- Psychology Today states, “confirmation bias suggests that we don’t perceive circumstances objectively.” Rather, “once we formed a view, we embrace the information that confirms that view while ignoring, or rejecting, information that casts doubt on it.”

Seeking Truth or Trying to Win an Argument

“Seek with great patience to understand your opponent’s position,” he advised, adding that it can be “very tempting just to fire back 'why you’re wrong.'”

Instead of going after what’s wrong, he said, one should seek also highlight what your opponent has right. This is an “extraordinarily helpful” way to get past impasses

Faithful Citizenship

- **U.S. Bishops' Statement every four years since 1976**
- **Participation in political process- a moral obligation and privilege**

Role of the Church

- Educate on social teachings, highlighting moral dimensions.
- “The Bishops do not tell Catholics how to vote; the responsibility to make political choices rests with each person and his or her properly formed conscience.”

What Public Policies Should Concern Catholics Most?

- Protecting human life
- Protecting the fundamental understanding of marriage
- Achieve immigration reform that offers a path to citizenship
- Help families and children overcome poverty
- Ensure access to and choice in education
- Provide health care while respecting human life and human dignity
- Oppose policies that reflect racism, hostility toward immigrants, religious bigotry, and other forms of unjust discrimination

Principles/Distinctions

- **Law/politics cannot be separated from morality....**
- **“A well-formed Christian conscience does not permit one to vote for a political program or an individual law which contradicts the fundamental contents of faith and morals.”**

Catholic Social Teaching

- *Life and dignity of the human person.*

Every human person is created in the image and likeness of God. Therefore, each person's life and dignity must be respected, whether that person is an innocent unborn child in a mother's womb, whether that person worked in the World Trade Center or a market in Baghdad, or even whether that person is a convicted criminal on death row.

Catholic Social Teaching

- *Rewards and challenges of family life:*

The human person is not only sacred, but also social. The God-given institutions of marriage—a lifelong commitment between a man and a woman—and family are central and serve as the foundations for social life.

Marriage and family should be supported and strengthened, not undermined.

Catholic Social Teaching

- *Rights and responsibilities.*

Every person has a fundamental right to life—the right that makes all other rights possible. Each person also has a right to the conditions for living a decent life—faith and family life, food and shelter, education and employment, health care and housing.

Catholic Social Teaching

- *Option for the poor and vulnerable.*

The Church calls on all of us to embrace this preferential option for the poor and vulnerable, to embody it in our lives and to work to have it shape public policies and priorities. A fundamental measure of our society is how we care for and stand with the poor and vulnerable.

Catholic Social Teaching

- *Dignity of work and the rights of workers.*

Work is more than a way to make a living; it is a form of continuing participation in God's act of creation. If the dignity of work is to be protected, then the basic rights of workers, owners and others must be respected—the right to productive work, to decent and fair wages, to organize and choose to join a union, to economic initiative and to ownership and private property.

Catholic Social Teaching

- *Solidarity.*

Loving our neighbor has global dimensions in a shrinking world. At the core of the virtue of solidarity is the pursuit of justice and peace.

Catholic Social Teaching

- *Caring for God's creation.*

The world that God created has been entrusted to us. Our use of it must be directed by God's plan for creation, not simply for our own benefit.
